



WHERE ART MEETS HEART

The Shop at Strathmore celebrates four decades of creativity and community

Tucked inside the historic Mansion at Strathmore, the Shop at Strathmore has become a beloved destination for unique finds and warmth and wonder infusing every shelf. This year, as the Shop celebrates its 40th anniversary, longtime patrons, volunteers, and staff

reflect on how a modest corner grew into a vibrant
haven of handcrafted artistry and community.

Founded in 1984 in the Mansion's pantry, the Shop began as a small consignment space initiated by Kitty Barclay, Strathmore's first docent, to earn revenue for the institution. It started humbly, with a minimal inventory of accessories and small décor items managed entirely by volunteers.

Over the years, the Shop evolved and expanded from the tiny pantry to an unoccupied office space and then, in 1997, to a newly renovated, dedicated retail space. A few years later, continued success allowed expansion into the adjacent gallery.

Today's Shop features more than 200 artists, offering everything from wearable art and entertaining essentials to music-themed kitchen tools and whimsical children's toys. Among its exclusive offerings is Strathmore's Signature Blend Tea, created specially by Master Tea Blender John Harney and served at the Mansion's Afternoon Tea events.



The collection is curated by Charlene McClelland, whose decades-long journey with Strathmore—from high school intern to volunteer to director of the Mansion—reflects a deep love of creative expression and community. Even after retirement, Charlene continues as the Shop's buyer and merchandiser, having shaped much of its evolution. She describes the Shop's mission as "retail with a purpose," with items carefully chosen to bring joy while fostering a rich community of artists and support for Strathmore's arts and education programs.

"I get excited listening to people show each other what they've found," McClelland says. "When I witness customers connecting over a shared appreciation for a unique item, that is really meaningful to me. We support artists in earning a living, helping them get something in return for their creativity and hard work."

That spirit keeps customers like Janey Richards, a devoted Strathmore volunteer since 2009, coming back. "It is the best shop I've ever been in," she says. "They just have wonderful things. You can buy something

really special for someone and not break the bank at all. It just feels like there's always a discovery there."

Richards particularly enjoys the Shop's collection of joyful pop-up flower cards, imaginative puppets, and accessories by regional artists. "It's great to know who made it, where they were from, what's the story behind it," she says.

Jill Gendleman, who has worked at the Shop for 36 of its 40 years, started as a volunteer and quickly found herself woven into the Mansion's fabric. "People comment how much this is like a museum. Every nook and cranny have something lovely and creative," she says. For Gendleman, the Shop is a form of therapy for customers and for herself. "I used to do personal counseling, now I do retail therapy! I've always been in the helping profession, and that's what keeps me here: people really appreciate me helping them." Many regulars know Gendleman by name and even call ahead to see when she's working. "We're always laughing in here. Customers hug me all the time."

The Shop at Strathmore isn't just a place to buy merchandise; it's a place to feel seen, inspired, and cared for. Whether you're simply browsing or hunting for the perfect present, you're likely to walk out with something more: a connection to the people and programs that are hallmarks of Strathmore. For many customers like Richards, the Shop also serves as a gateway to Strathmore's broader arts programming, a mission that extends beyond the Mansion's walls through an online store.

As McClelland puts it, the Shop at Strathmore is filled with positive energy. "From the salespeople working with customers to get just the right gift, to talking to artists about their work, I think it makes a difference—and I think you can feel it."

YOUNG LEADERS FIND THEIR VOICE

The New Strathmore Youth Chorus Singing Ambassadors program empowers high schoolers to make an impact

When 16-year-old Strathmore Youth Chorus (SYC) member Sofia Veshi heard about a new leadership program, she jumped at the chance to apply. "I've been a chorister for almost a decade," explains Sofia. "I wanted some way to give back and involve myself more, especially as graduation draws nearer."

Launched in January, SYC Singing Ambassadors enables select SYC highschool choristers to assist with younger ensembles,

from leading vocal warm-ups to helping students navigate challenging sections of music.

"Ambassadors make the rehearsal process much more efficient and engaging. They can give individualized help to young choristers, so the director can stay focused on the holistic growth of the larger group," says SYC Production Manager Rachel Borczuch, who created the program. "Our directors love having them in the room."

The feeling is mutual. "I've gotten to know many Treble Chorus members on a personal level," says Heidi Gohari, a sophomore with seven years in SYC. "After one rehearsal, the choristers were all talking to me at once. Whether it was about something they thought was funny during the rehearsal or something in their personal lives that bothered them, they found that sharing it with me was important."



Sofia also finds these connections with younger choristers deeply satisfying. It's especially meaningful watching her seven-year-old sister join the children's choir. Becoming an ambassador, she explains, "feels as though my journey as a singer here at Strathmore has gone full circle."

For Borczuch, seeing these young leaders develop confirms her belief that arts programs should amplify youth voices both on and off stage. She's proud of the inaugural class of 10 ambassadors and hopes to expand the program.

"We've already invited ambassadors to a staff meeting, where they started proposing ideas for SYC programming," says Borczuch. She'd love to see all youth programs at Strathmore offer similar opportunities for student leadership.

With this promising start, the possibilities for this arts education program seem limitless.

THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS

Burtonsville Day showcases Strathmore's commitment to bringing the arts directly to Montgomery County communities

On September 20, marching bands, floats, and local luminaries will step off from Paint Branch High School in Burtonsville and make their way down Old Columbia Pike to the Marilyn J. Praisner Library and Community Recreation Center. At the Burtonsville Day festival grounds, parade participants will be greeted by dozens of local organizations, businesses, and food trucks. On the performance stage, Strathmore Artist in Residence alum Dante' Pope will kick off the celebration.

"I don't know exactly what I'll perform yet, but as a soul artist and drummer, it'll be a cross-genre performance that speaks to all generations," says Pope, who has toured with the Americana strings band Old Crow Medicine Show.

Like Pope's music, which aims to reach a wide-ranging audience, Strathmore's involvement in Burtonsville Day reflects its mission to provide meaningful arts experiences that enrich individuals and strengthen communities.







Strathmore's partnership with Burtonsville Day started in 2015, the same year it launched its East County Strings program and Step Up to College program with Paint Branch High School. "One of our values is to be engaged not just on our Music Center campus, but throughout the county," says Pablo de Oliveira, Strathmore's education and community engagement manager. "We prioritize being present in East County to co-create quality arts experiences with these communities."

This philosophy extends beyond traditional arts programming, with Strathmore participating in events like MoCo Green Fest to build connections across all sectors. The strategy reflects meeting people where they are, rather than expecting residents to travel to North Bethesda.

Each year, Strathmore provides the sound system and advises Burtonsville Day organizers on artist selection. This year's lineup includes Pope and 2013 Artist in Residence alum Deborah Bond, a celebrated singer and voice-over artist.

Since 1991, Burtonsville Day has united East County's diverse communities, according to festival director Peter Myo Khin. While the event began as a celebration of Burtonsville itself, it has grown to encompass neighboring areas such as Hillandale, White Oak, Briggs Chaney, Colesville, Cloverly, and Spencerville. This year's theme, Building a Better Community Together, underscores that mission. Attendance has grown to more than 5,000 residents annually, and Khin says Strathmore has been pivotal in helping broaden the festival's musical offerings. Before partnering with Strathmore, the music selection was one-dimensional, but now festivalgoers enjoy a range of styles—from hip-hop to rock and everything in between.

"We discuss the needs of the community in terms of arts," de Oliveira explains. "We find artists and formats that serve their needs. At last year's Burtonsville Day, we also incorporated local dance troupes, so they're part of the performance and feel special. It's a collaborative effort that speaks to their tastes but still has a Strathmore flavor to it."

In addition to impacting the community, Strathmore's boots-on-the-ground approach also transforms individual lives. De Oliveira recalls connecting a parent of a child with autism at Burtonsville Day to Strathmore's sensory-friendly programming and free ticket programs. The family now regularly attends performances at the Music Center, gaining access to arts experiences that wouldn't otherwise be available to them.

For de Oliveira, these types of partnerships succeed because they put a human face on Strathmore for East County residents who might otherwise see it as distant or exclusive. "We are in North Bethesda, a very wealthy region, and the name somehow conveys like we're in England," de Oliveira jokes. "But when people get to talk to our staff at these festivals, when they see we have a sense of humor and are community-oriented, it makes a difference. It puts a friendly face to the organization—a connection they may not have otherwise understood to be there."

THE ART OF TRADITION

One family discovers that collecting original artwork is about more than decoration

Jon Gerson's interest in handmade art started when he was young by attending craft shows with his mother. She helped him understand the difference between mass-produced pottery and pieces shaped by hand and to notice the careful craftsmanship in wood furniture and textiles.

"She was the genesis for my love of handcrafted art," says Gerson.

Those early lessons stuck with him. As a teenager, Gerson started collecting art himself. When he got his first home, he continued collecting. And when he married Susan and had his son Eliot, it became something the whole family did together. Today, their Kensington home displays a diverse collection spanning stained glass, sculptures, fiber art, and paintings, many of which came from Strathmore's Drawing for Art event.

The Gerson family has been attending Drawing for Art since it started in the early 1990s. Artists donate original pieces, which get raffled off to attendees for just the cost of the ticket—around \$100. It's a way for art lovers to get high-quality works at an accessible price while supporting Strathmore's visual art programs.

"Drawing for Art is for a great cause," says Gerson. "We have almost always come home with something that's a good match for our collection."

Their selection process has become a ritual. Weeks before each event, family members visit Strathmore's Mansion to preview the works, each ranking favorites according to personal taste. With such diverse preferences, they often buy multiple tickets to avoid "heated negotiation," Gerson laughs.

As their collection has grown, wall space is now at a premium; they've shifted toward stained glass pieces and sculptures that can be displayed on existing furniture. "One of us would really have to make the case for a 2-D wall piece," Gerson jokes.

Some pieces have ended up in other homes, too. In 2010, knowing that Strathmore founder

Eliot Pfanstiehl's family really wanted a metal music scale wall piece, the Gersons chose it specifically as a gift when their number was drawn early. Gerson had worked at Strathmore in its early days as one of the original employees, so he and Pfanstiehl were longtime friends and colleagues.

Certain works hold special meaning. A 3-D pottery mask by polymer artist Carol Zilliacus has been his son Eliot's favorite since childhood. A Chinese brush painting by Nellie Chao connects to the family's previous admiration for the artist's work.

For Gerson, collecting art is still about creativity and family connection, just like those early craft fair trips with his mother. He's passed the tradition down to Eliot, now in his early 30s, who's started bringing the important people in his life to Drawing for Art. "Drawing for Art provides texture and color," Gerson reflects, "along with the opportunity for people in our community to connect with one another."

MICHAEL McSWEENEY (January 2026) is a percussionist, bandleader, educator, and arts administrator whose performance career spans the US, Ghana, Trinidad, Colombia, and Bali. He brings expertise in salsa, Afro-Cuban and Ewe drumming, rock, pop, steel pan, jazz, classical, and global fusion. Since 2016, he has led the Chicago- and DMV-based band Costas Colectivo and regularly performs with local groups including Son Cubano Subterráneo, Avenue 66, and Panjung Duo. 

FROM ALADDIN TO 80s ANTHEMS

Lea Salonga brings music from the "Stage, Screen & Everything in Between" to Strathmore

Broadway legend and Disney icon Lea Salonga returns to the Music Center at Strathmore this December for a performance that promises to be as genre-spanning as her remarkable career. A trailblazer for representation in entertainment, Salonga was the first Asian actress to win a Tony, for *Miss Saigon* in 1991, and the first to play the role of Éponine in 1993's *Les Misérables*. Fans may also recognize her as the singing voice of *Aladdin's* Princess Jasmine and Mulan.

In our conversation, Salonga reveals backstage rituals, shares her favorite holiday song, and makes a surprising confession about a classic 80s film.

Q: What do you remember about performing at Strathmore?

A: I remember wood, so much wood! The first time I stepped out on the stage for a rehearsal, the whole house was empty, and everything was just bathed in very bright light. It felt welcoming and warm, and everyone was so hospitable and lovely.

Q: Do you have any backstage routines or good luck charms?

A: I do a warm-up, put my face on, put my costume on, get my microphone, and then head down to the stage and wait for the show to start. It's pretty basic. I don't have a full crazy ritual that gets me ready—although I do keep an elephant or two in my dressing room. My aunt gave me my first one, and she said the trunk needs to point towards the stage and be up for good luck. I've been collecting them ever since.

A: I think when I launch into "Don't You (Forget About Me)" from *The Breakfast Club*. Oh my gosh, that's fun. This is my childhood.




DONOR SPOTLIGHT

A GIFT THAT KEPT GROWING

How one holiday present sparked two decades of giving from Janet and Michael Rowan

As they stepped through the velvet ropes that evening, they realized the gift offered more than just a night out. Musical Roots

Both Janet and Michael come from music-loving families. Janet's childhood home was filled with the sound of her piano, and she played French horn at Richard Montgomery High School. Michael was more of a "radio player," but his love of music was just as strong.

Creating Magic

One magical memory illustrates what makes Strathmore feel so special. After a neighborhood nurse helped Michael during a medical emergency, the Rowans wanted to show their thanks. They learned the nurse's daughter had just started playing violin and brought her to see Joshua Bell perform.

As members, they secured front-row seats for the dress rehearsal. Afterward, Bell invited the girl onstage and asked what she was learning. "He closes his eyes, tilts his head back, and starts to play it," Janet recalls. "She looked like she had died and gone to heaven. That's the kind of experience you can't get at a bigger institution."

Their Giving Philosophy

Moments like that drive the Rowans' philanthropy.

For ticketed Music Center performances: Complimentary parking is available in the Grosvenor-Strathmore Metro garage. The entrance is located off Tuckerman Lane.

For nonperformance Music Center events, including all Education Center events: Metered parking is available on Tuckerman Lane, or park in the Metro garage, which requires a SmarTrip or credit card payment of \$5.20 Monday through Friday. Parking is free on weekends.
